Keeping Up With the Joneses

We often refer to John or Jane Doe as an anonymous person with an attribute that can be used to make a point or tell a story. But perhaps more common than the Does are the Joneses who supposedly set a standard for "the good life."

Some Joneses in real life would be hard to keep up with, but not because of their standard of living. None of us could claim John Paul Jones's title, Father of the American Navy, for his valor and leadership during the American Revolution. Few of us are taller than Ed "Too Tall" Jones who at 6' 9" was a defensive lineman for the Dallas Cowboys. Few of us could surpass the exuberance of Charlie "Tremendous" Jones, a Christian motivational speaker famous for quotes such as, "Sometimes God has to break you down to bless you up. Learn from your mistakes." And there are no doubt many other outstanding Joneses in real life, too.

One of the secrets of living contentedly is to avoid comparisons and measure ourselves by God's Word, not by the seemingly superior circumstances of an acquaintance or celebrity. God's inerrant Word measures godly character; unreliable human standards measure things that will not matter in eternity. "Godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out" (1 Timothy 6:6–7).

Jesus also warns us in Luke 12:15, "Take heed, and beware of covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth."

We can forget about what the Joneses have and be content with what we have, according to Hebrews 13:5, because God has promised, "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee." He is faithful!
