Anyone who has ever played baseball has heard those familiar words. In fact, American culture has adopted that phrase to apply to a number of different situations. However, the bottom line is the same in each one. Mistakes aren't allowed. Performance is the only thing that really matters. You've only got a couple of chances and then you're out. We live in a "no second chance" kind of world.

King David knew all about striking out. Out on the roof, relaxing in the evening, he lusted after another man's wife. (Strike One!) He committed adultery with her and she became pregnant. (Strike Two!) He then had her husband murdered in battle to cover-up the first two strikes! (Strike Three!)

David, you're out of there. Hang it up. You're done. That's the human way of responding to failure, isn't it?

I, for one, am certainly glad that we don't have a "three strikes and you're out" God. Psalm 103:10–12 says, "He has not dealt with us according to our sins, nor rewarded us according to our iniquities. For as high as the heavens are above the earth, so great is His loving kindness toward those who fear Him. As far as the east is from the west, so far has He removed OUR transgressions from us,"

King David wrote those words after the Bathsheba incident. He had to live with the consequences of his sin, but when he repented, God forgave Him. Perhaps there is someone reading this today who needs to know that there is nothing, absolutely nothing, that God can't forgive when we truly repent. And He'll never, ever throw it back in your face!
